


I have not been able to confirm someone for our February L&S, so we will host an Image Review on the night. More details to follow soon.



Closing date for Photovault: Friday 23 February Competition night: Wednesday 28 February

Probably the world's most famous street photographer is Henri Cartier-Bresson. He is the street photographer credited with being able to capture "the decisive moment". If you are interested in reading about him and seeing a selection of his work, click on the link **here**.

There is also an incredibly exhaustive guide by Lensculture.com. It's 90 pages long, and can be downloaded from them for free - all they ask for is your email address and consent. You can access the guide *here*.
